Welcome to Winnipeg and the 2025 COPE SEPB Convention!

These next three days will be action-packed with plenty of inspiring speakers to hear from, and lots of work to do. We will be receiving updates on activities happening across our union, and debating resolutions that will set the direction for our national union for the next three years.

Today, we will hear from our national president, Annette Toth, who will deliver her first report since being acclaimed to this leadership role after our 2022 Convention. We will hear reports from our National Secretary-Treasurer, Pierrick Choinière-Lapointe, as well as reports from Region 1 and Region 2.

Our keynote speaker of the day is Fabrice Vil. Fabrice is a lawyer, columnist for La Presse, a speaker and facilitator of corporate workshops, and a basketball

coach. In 2011, he founded Pour 3 Points, an organization that transforms sports coaches into life coaches to support young people, particularly from disadvantaged communities. He has been one of Quebec's most influential voices on the issue of equal opportunity and has also been an advocate speaking out against gun violence and racism.

Also addressing delegates today will be Melissa

Dvorak, President of the Winnipeg Labour Council. Prior to be elected to the role in 2019, Melissa was president of the Manitoba General Employees' Union Local 369.

In June 2004, leaders from across Canada—from BC to Quebec—gathered in Florida at the OPEIU Convention with the goal to declare our autonomy from the American-run union, OPEIU. Our national union's structure exists to support growth and solidarity, while allowing locals to retain autonomy to make decisions that best serve their members. This balance has defined our success—and it's how we'll continue to build on it. This is the story of our union.
